Call for admission instructions. Due to bird flu, birds may be admitted at an offsite location for examination and quarantine. At present time Tamarack is able to admit birds of prey all ages, adult songbirds, adult woodpeckers, wild ducklings, mammals all ages (except rabies vector species), reptiles, and amphibians. This is subject to change depending on case load.

Daily 9am-3pm by appointment.



Spring was late to arrive this year, but now the leaves are out and birds are filling the forests again with their beautiful songs. Baby rabbits, squirrels, opossums, and birds of all varieties are now entering the world. The staff, interns, and volunteers of TWC welcome the changing of the seasons as they poise themselves for the arrival of spring patients and gear up for programs. This year has been busy already with over 350 patients admitted for treatment, many more to come, and lots of programs being booked.

Other changes are happening too, including with our staff. We are excited to welcome Jess Schombert as our new Wildlife Rehabilitation Manager (WRM). Our previous WRM, Heather Wayne, has transitioned to a new job as a wildlife technician with the Pennsylvania Game Commission, where she is studying wild turkeys. She continues to be a part of Tamarack though, assisting with wildlife rehab and conducting education programs, now as a volunteer.

Change is afoot at our center as construction has begun on a new aviary to house several of our ambassador raptors, thanks to the generosity of a local family foundation. The design of this aviary will allow it to be adjustable and transportable as the center continues to grow and develop into the future.

The Tamarack community continues to grow, and we thank all of you for caring about wildlife and supporting wildlife rehabilitation and education in northwestern Pennsylvania. We could not do this work without you!



Katie Brozell has been a licensed falconer since the age of 16, and has volunteered at Tamarack for 4 years. When a young Red-tailed Hawk nicknamed "Cass" was admitted last summer, the bird quickly recovered from a concussion and heavy parasite load, but needed to learn hunting skills. TWC partners with falconers to help raptor patients learn these skills, so Katie volunteered to help Cass. She invested many hours with Cass this winter, and together they successfully hunted a variety of game from rabbits to meadow voles. This spring on a warm, blue sky day, Katie released Cass, now ready for life on her own.

Homecoming: TWC Welcomes New Wildlife Rehabilitation Manager

The woman enters the enclosure, one arm encased in a falconer's glove. She closes the door behind her and stands ready, the gloved arm outstretched. The bird swivels his head to look at her with an arch, perennially fierce gaze. In a flash he launches from

his perch and alights on the glove, settling himself with a ruffle of steel-gray feathers. His dark eyes are direct, fearless, and he looks at her as if to say, "Where do we go from here?"

The woman is Jessica Schombert and the bird is Apollo, Tamarack's ambassador Peregrine Falcon. Jessica is no stranger to TWC. She worked at the center throughout her four years as a student at Allegheny College where she majored in Environmental Studies with a minor in Biology. Jess says that her time at Tamarack as a student changed her life, inspiring her love of birds and her passion to work together in a positive team. As a student, Jess

trained Apollo, using choice based, positive reinforcement techniques, and developed expertise in wildlife wound care and treatment of eagles. After graduation, Jess went on to become a Senior Aviculturist at the National Aviary. There she specialized in husbandry of seabirds, shorebirds, and other exotic birds. Like a proud parent, Jess is happy to show you photos of the baby Flamingos she raised and trained.

Now, in much the same way as many birds return home from their long journey southward to winter grounds, Jess has completed her own migration. She has found her way back to her roots, back to the bird and the people who inspire her. Jess gets to implement her passion for animal welfare as she oversees patient care, ambassador training, and recruits and trains volunteers. She is an advocate of patient and ambassador enrichment, a program that provides mental as well as physical stimulation for the birds. Sharing her love of wildlife, Jess lights a fire of excitement for care of our environment in volunteers and education program participants. She is a self-proclaimed bird nerd, and proud of it.

Intern 2021-2022 Spotlight:

BARAKA OSBORNE



Background:

Baraka is a rising junior majoring in Psychology and minoring in English at Allegheny College. He grew up in Newark, DE and interns at TWC through Allegheny's Bonner Program.

What did you like best in your internship?

I've always wanted to work with animals, but have never had an opportunity like this. It's amazing to hold a Great Horned Owl for treatment, help examine an eagle, or feed a baby squirrel. I also like working with the other people here and seeing how passionate they are.

What surprised you in your internship?

Before, I was aware of wildlife rehabilitation but until being here, I had no idea how much care, knowledge and skill goes into it. In the exam room there are so many tools! The staff are prepared for the best and the worst. They are professional and caring, for the animals, volunteers and each other.

What inspired you to care about the natural world?

Growing up, I was an "outside kid." Being outside so much has helped me get closer to nature.

What message do you have to share?

Step outside your comfort zone. Try something new! Until coming to Tamarack I had no idea how much care and skill goes into wildlife rehabilitation. I am happy and grateful to be at Tamarack.



Bird Flu Outbreak

As you may have heard, a new severe form of bird flu known as highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) virus, subtype H5N1, is causing illness in both domestic and wild birds. It is hoped this will subside with warmer weather. First detected in North America in December, it has spread throughout the US, resulting in the loss of 35 million domestic poultry, as well as numerous wild birds. In our region, HPAI has been confirmed in Bald Eagles and wild ducks, but has not been as impactful as other areas of the country.

This flu variant can be carried and spread by waterfowl, shore birds, gulls, and crows that show no symptoms. It is highly fatal to poultry, raptors, and some other wild bird species. Biologists are concerned it could become transmissible to humans, but this has not been an issue thus far. TWC has been collaborating with the PA Game Commission and professionals at other rehab centers and zoos to monitor the incidence of HPAI, protect TWC's beloved education birds, and keep our staff, volunteers, and the public safe.

Due to concerns about the virus, please do not arrive unannounced at the center with a wild bird! We are still treating birds, but they are being admitted at an offsite location for evaluation and testing prior to moving to the center for treatment. Our phone helpline volunteers will give you instructions for admission.

You can help control the spread of this bird flu:

- Don't feed wild waterfowl, which can cause them to congregate and increase transmission.
- You can leave up songbird feeders and baths, since there is no evidence of transmission among songbirds.
- Please inform the Game Commission at 717-787-4250 if you find a raptor, turkey, grouse, gulls, crow, or 5 or more waterbirds either dead or displaying neurological symptoms such as circling or holding the head in an unnatural position. Do not approach the animal.
- If you have poultry or pet birds, protect them by reducing their exposure to feces of wild waterfowl and other wild birds, and by cleaning/disinfecting your footwear and equipment before entering their enclosure. Report any signs of disease to the PA Dept. of Agriculture.
- Wildlife Rehab centers and other nonprofits housing birds are investing substantial resources for enhanced biosecurity. If you have the capacity, please support them with an extra donation. It is especially appreciated at this time!

To learn more about this virus, please visit our website. We will post updates on the virus on our Facebook page as they are available. It is hoped the virus will subside with the advent of warmer weather. Time will tell!

The spread of a new variant of Avian Influenza among wildlife rocked our world, but with biosecurity protocols in place, we have a plan to keep our ambassador raptors patients safe. We are admitting avian patients offsite for examination and testing, and on-site have increased disinfection and limited access. Hopefully, the virus subsides as the

weather warms.

Education programs are a joy, as we see eyes light up with amazement at meeting a hawk or owl up close. Whether it is a young person or elderly, the delight is same, always thrilling to witness. We hope to see you at a program soon! Our hearts also leap with joy to see our patients grow healthy and go free. In recent weeks we have released Red-tailed Hawks, Cooper's

Hawks, Turkey Vultures, Barred Owls, Painted Turtles, Eastern Cottontails, Virginia Opossums, Cedar Waxwings, Northern Cardinals, and Mourning Doves. More will be released soon. Each one was aided by someone who found it and took the time to get it help.
